

One Program, One Journey

Our new award scheme has changed to follow a simpler format for all Sections.

Program Essentials



These are our Milestones. They encourage your Scout to actively participate, assist, and lead on the weekly program activities that each Unit Council organises for the term.

Outdoor Adventurous Skills

This is the biggest change to the system. From Joeys to Rovers, the OAS system is recognised as you progress through Scouting. Once achieved, your Scout will hold that qualification going forward!

Peak Award Journey



This is the final climb of the Mountain journey. Your Scout needs to lead an adventurous journey, partake a leadership course, and finally, reflect on the journey to where they are.

As a parent, you will learn more about this system as your child progresses. You will also have lots of opportunities to support your child to get the most of what they want from Scouting.

Membership Fees

For 2024, our Group fees totals at \$530.00/yr.

The fees cover but is not limited to:

- Branch Membership fee
- Insurance Coverage
- Leader Training
- Asset Maintenance

You can pay these fees on a payment plan if you

wish; however, it needs to be arranged with our Treasurer before invoice due dates. Fees are calculated on a *pro rata* basis, adjusted on an annually set fee schedule.

We will issue a Xero invoice in due course and allow you to pay in two ways:

- Direct bank transfer
- Credit/Debit card via Stripe

Scouts Queensland is also a FairPlay Activity Provider. Your vouchers need to be sent to treasurer@ptss.scoutsqld.com.au to be redeemed and credited.

Operoo

Scouts Queensland licenses Operoo, which is a forms, communication, and health management software. Operoo is very important for our Leaders, especially away from the Hall, to retrieve any medical information that you have disclosed about your Scout should a medical emergency arise. Upon joining, Operoo will request you to create a profile for your child. Please fill this profile out and maintain it if there is new information.

We also collect responses to activities away from the den as part of our duty of care responsibilities. Whilst this is a convenient system, we ask our parents to check your Operoo regularly to see if your child has outstanding responses to attend to.

We also recommend you create a rule filter to highlight or organise your email inbox for Operoo emails, as they can get "spammy." You can generally find support pages on your respective email service (such as Gmail's <u>page</u>) on how to set these up.

We also require you to indicate **yes** or **no** when an activity request is sent out. This is for our records and to indicate any costs to you as applicable. If no indication is provided, we will assume the response is **no**.

The Award Scheme

A beloved staple of Scouts is our Peak Awards! From Joeys to Rovers, the completion of the final award of the Section is a fulfilling and rewarding experience. Not everyone in Scouts aims for the Peak Award though!











As we mentioned earlier, the Scheme is broken into three components: Program Essentials, the Outdoor Adventurous Skills, and the Peak Award.

Milestones







The Milestones form the core component of our Program Essentials. Each Milestone is a representation of the active participation, assisting, and leading of normal weekly activities! From participating in a sailboat to leading a pioneering activity, the Milestones are the foundation of our award scheme.

The Milestones can be categorised across four areas:

- Community
- Creative
- Outdoors
- Personal Growth

These are called Challenge Areas and Scouts are encouraged to develop themselves across these areas by aiming their weekly programs to follow the Area themes. This can range from camping to leadership reflective courses!

Special Interest Areas



Scouts recognises that every Scout has personal hobbies and other skills develop each Scout. This is where our Special Interest Areas lie! It's a personal challenge to every Scout in eight areas that build upon your Scout's existing hobbies and skills. For example, if your Scout is good at sailing but teaching sailing is more difficult, your Scout can work towards building his teaching skills! These contribute to the Peak Award in each Section once your Scout completes enough of them.

Outdoor Adventurous Skills

This is the link between our program and the adventurous activities your Scout experiences! These develop the skills for a broad range of outdoor activities such as camping and sailing! There are two types of OAS badges: Core Skills and Specialist Skills.

Camping, bushwalking, and bushcraft are considered Core Skills and are used by Scouts in everyday activities like hikes, first aid, and navigation.

Specialist Skills focus on specific skill streams in six main areas. At our Group, we take great pride to advance our Scouts in the Boating and Sailing Stream!

It's important to know that the skills developed are aligned with the national activity standards and can later be recognised as national and VET competency skills!

Unique to Scouts Australia, Scouts Terrain is our custom-built digital platform designed for 21st century Scouting and is more than just a platform to record the achievement of our Scouts. Uniforms

Uniforms can be purchased online directly from the Scout Shop from this <u>link</u>.

Your Scout is required to purchase:

- Section Uniform (button-up or polo)
- A Light Blue Youth Scarf (linked)
- A woggle
- Queensland Scarf badge
- Sandstone pants/shorts

The scarf is a visual difference you will find only in Sea Scout Groups. We are permitted to wear the light blue scarf versus the standard maroon scarf across Queensland.

Sandstone is the official-coloured pants and is recommended to purchase this for official occasions. For regular meeting nights, any appropriately coloured shorts or pants is permitted.

Your Scout has the *option* of purchasing:

- A Sea Scout lanyard
- A (Sea) Scout belt
- Wide brim Scout hats
- Other associated Scout uniform merchandise

These are not required for the uniform; however, you may wear other Scout branded clothing appropriate to the occasion.

Unique Traditions of Scouting

When Scouts meet, we greet each other by shaking hands with the **left** hand. It is a symbolic gesture of friendship and trust. Its origins refer to the warriors that carried their shield with their left hand, therefore, to shake with the left hand requires discarding the shield and meeting openly and showing trust.

The Scout Salute is a gesture of respect and commitment. The salute is given with the right hand formed to display three fingers only. The three fingers of the Scout Salute represent the three key points of the promise (duty to your God, duty to self and duty to others). We only salute at parade and ceremonies.



Parental Involvement

Scouting doesn't stop when the weekly section meeting finishes! When your Scout is invested, they voluntarily take an oath of how they will live. We expect you to support and encourage them while at home, at school, or elsewhere, by:

- Encouraging completion of badgework
- Encouraging the adoption of the Scout Law and Promise
- Encouraging participation as fully as possible with the program
- Encouraging respect for Leaders, and Scouting in general

If your Scout will not be attending meetings, please notify your Leader at the earliest. If your Scout is regularly missing Scouts, we will begin to contact you to find out why as their safety and success in Scouting is a concern of ours.



All Scout Groups are run by volunteers only. We are no different. As such, we do have an expectation for parents to help out and assist our Leaders at our activities where possible. Your contribution is always appreciated at fundraising, working bees, and with logistics. We do know that not all families can contribute all the time, however, many hands make light work!

Once you submit the application, the Group Leader will review your Scout's application before endorsing it. Upon the application's endorsement, your Scout is now:

- A member of largest youth organisation in the world
- Eligible to attend State, National, and International events if the criteria are met
- Insured for Adventurous Activities within Scouting

When the application is approved, our Treasurer will send you an invoice with our membership fees for the remainder Scouting year, which is usually 1st April every year.
